



No Cost to Attend!

The Freemasons of Vermont pay all participant expenses for training, materials, lodging and meals. Schools are only responsible for the cost of substitute teachers and providing the organizers with a signed letter of commitment.

History

Vermont Freemasons have underwritten more than \$600,000 in training costs since 1990 to support this program at no cost to attendees. Since that time, more than 226 Vermont schools have been represented at this training (some more than once)!. Using certified instructors from the national Masonic Model Student Assistance Program, the Vermont Masons Comprehensive Assessment and Recovery Effort program (C.A.R.E) is the second longest running program in the United States.
